The buildings now completed are the property of the Vicar
and his successors but the fixtures within the house are
the private property of the present Tenant - -

THE OLD VICARAGE

The house, built in 1856, receives favourable comments in Sherwood and Pevsner's book *Buildings of Oxfordshire*, Introduction, pp 403,788

"Of great interest is Steeple Barton Rectory [sic], 1856, by S.S. Teulon, restrained for this architect. It is asymmetrical with Queen Anne sash windows, an advanced design at this date.

Inside, an unusual plan with rooms opening from a hexagonal hall."

An account of the building of the Vicarage was given in 1859 by William Wing, the energetic land agent and surveyor from Steeple Aston, who kept the Vestry minutes


He gratefully acknowledged the handsome donation of Mr Joseph Painter one of the land owners, of a piece of pasture land worth in his judgment at least £50 as an addition to the site of the old Glebe house. Gifts of stones bricks lime haulage etc by other landowners and Parishioners were deserving of thanks, the cost of the building was £1078 15 8

The architect was S S Teulon and Wing had some reservations about him He commented that eleven meetings were held by the Committee set up to oversee the building of the Vicarage. These were attended also by Mr Henry Franklin of Deddington the contractor but not one by Mr Teulon the Architect

Teulon, a Londoner, was also criticized by Wing for overlooking the necessity of providing a country clergyman with a stable and a piggery. He wrote

"It appears to me that some comfort and convenience have been sacrificed to the prevailing taste of the day for mediaevalism and that a Vicarage-house without a stable or piggery is a strong proof of the Cockneyism of the Architect at the same time that I record my admiration of the external features of the house and my belief that the workmanship and materials are good and durable."
