Extract from Will William Wells Taylor 25 March 1780

Extracted from Registry of Archdeacon of Oxford

He appointed two friends Sampson Roles Evans and William Stevenson joint Executors in Trust. Will proved at Oxford 27 April 1782

From title deeds 41 Nov 56.

1762 William Wells, tailor, in his will leaves to his son William Wells
house and little house adjoining with barn garden orchard

1780 William Wells, tailor, in his will leaves to sister Elizabeth Welch
house in Westcott Barton occupied by John Brooks

Marginal notes have been made on a copy of the 1780 will which has been kept with the deeds of Cottage on the Horse Common.

House in which he lived left to Martha Stockford. Marginal note Job Egglestone's [in Jacob's Yard?].

House in Middle Barton with shop, in occupation Thos Busby to his nephew John Gibbard. Marginal note Luing.

House in Westcot Barton in occupation John Brooks. Marginal note Chilton's.
