You are about to start The Great Bartons Treasure Hunt!

All you need is this trail booklet (each has a unique entry number), a pen/pencil to cross off the answers to the clues, comfortable shoes, and oodles of observation. You will need to look up, down, and all around every stopping point to solve each clue. Each clue will point you to a place name on the map in the centre of this booklet. Beware – the clues are not all immediately obvious. They have been very specifically worded to help you find the answer but you really do need to read them carefully!

As you unravel each clue you will be able to eliminate a place name from the map in the centre of this booklet until at the end of the trail there should be only one place name remaining – this is where the treasure is buried!

The trail covers approximately 2 miles in a roughly circular route around the villages and can be walked at a leisurely pace in about $2\frac{1}{2}$ -3 hours. However, it is not necessary to complete the trail in one day – you can stop where you wish and continue from that point on another occasion.

N.B. There are no obstacles to climb and ABSOLUTELY NO NEED TO TRESPASS ON PRIVATE PROPERTY - all clues can be seen from the footpath or road.

The trail will cause you to cross the main road more than once, so great care must be taken, and all children must be accompanied by an adult.

Remember, follow each direction, stop at the point it takes you to, solve the clue, then eliminate the place name on the map. Once you have identified all 40 place names and crossed them off the map, you should have just one name left. That is the answer!

Find the starting point and off you go!
